

Acquittal:	The accused/convicted has been exonerated of criminal wrongdoing.
Anti-Terrorism Act:	The main anti-terrorism legislation in Pakistan dictating both the offence and procedure.
Anti-Terrorism Court:	The Special Court promulgated to hear and decide terrorism cases and a court of first instance.
Case Citation:	A specific combination of year, court, journal and page number to identify a judge's decision.
Code of Criminal Procedure:	A code dictating procedure for criminal cases including investigations, trials and appeals in Pakistan.
Date of Sentencing:	Date on which the person was sentenced to death by the trial court.
District and Sessions Court:	A court of trial for offences punishable by death.
Justices:	The title given to High Court and Supreme Court judges.
Juvenile Justice Act:	An Act streamlining the procedure for the trial and care of juvenile offenders.
Juvenile Justice System Ordinance:	The first law on procedure and protection of juvenile offenders in Pakistan recently repealed by the JJSO.
Juvenility:	Minor at the time of offence.
Mental Health Ordinance:	A law relating to the mentally disordered persons with respect to their care and treatment, the management of their property and other related matters.
Mental Illness:	Prisoner has a history of serious mental health problems (s2(m) of the mental health ordinance).
Military Court:	A court established for a limited time with fewer procedural rights for those who have committed heinous crimes against the state including civilians.
Motive and Cause:	The purpose for or intention behind committing the offence.
Overturned:	The death sentence converted to a reduced sentence for example life imprisonment or any other imprisonment term.
Pakistan Penal Code:	A code dictating all the general offences in Pakistan.
Terrorism (traditional definition):	The unlawful use of violence and intimidation, especially against civilians, in the pursuit of political aims.
Torture:	this is to denote whether the prisoner has been tortured by a government official at any point in the criminal justice system.
Type of Court:	Court of trial.
